These past months have brought home to all of us the vital importance of working together to slow and limit the spread of Coronavirus. We know we are called to be a community of faith, not fear. We also know we are called to care for the most vulnerable in our midst, to be good stewards of our staff and resources, and to be good citizens of the wider community.

Under normal circumstances, people of faith would care for each other by drawing close together. It's what we do. It's who we are. In times of loss or threat, we respond by coming together to pray and to sing, to hug and hold each other tight.

"A CALL TO RETURN" WITH CARLYLE STEWART We have reached the halfway point of our series, "A Call to Return: Spiritual Reflections on Racial Justice." 





LOOKING AHEAD TO ADVENT

THE LIGHT THAT SHINES IN THE DARKNESS: Spiritual Practices for Advent 2020

As the days grow shorter and the shadows of these immensely challenging times seem to lengthen all around us, please join our online worship, study and prayer this season as we wait and watch for the light of Christmas! John's Gospel reminds us that the Light shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it! This is a good and needed word for these times—one to remember, ponder and pray. And yet, how does having only negative connotations of darkness relate to our current moment of racial reckoning? How do negative connotations of darkness shape our experience of the pandemic and post-election moment we will be living through in December! Can we find goodness and blessing in the dark and the light, in the knowledge that God created the day and the night and called them both good? In darkness and in light, how can we wait, and labor and prepare for the light and joy and new birth that come at Christmas? In looming darkness and dawning light, how can we hold the light of the Christ child, a Light unto the world?



ADVENT LECTIO DIVINA—HOLY READING Sundays, December 6, 13 & 20, 9:30 am, via Zoom Join Dan, Lexi, and Jaz in a short conversation about reimagining advent themes of light and darkness and a time for spiritual practice called lectio divina, "holy reading." In this ancient contemplative practice, we'll read Advent scripture passages together and be invited to meditate on how God's word intersects with our lives. WIDER COMMUNITY ACTIONS AND EVENTS

DONATE TO HELP HURRICANE ETA VICTIMS IN CENTRAL AMERICA Hurricane Eta has hit Central America with devastating consequences. Our Community Minister in Latin America Monica Maher invites our help through the Friends Peace Teams Peacebuilding *en las Américas* program, of which she is a part. Partners in Honduras and Guatemala have been particularly affected. Bridges have fallen. Whole neighborhoods are under water. People line rooftops awaiting evacuation by boat. In many areas where houses have not flooded, there is no running water or electricity. Food is scarce and prices have gone up. The situation, already dire due to Covid, hunger and violence, is now much worse. UPDATE ON UCC MEDICAL DEBT FORGIVENESS CAMPAIGN First Church in Cambridge joined with 121 other churches to abolish \$26.2 million in medical debt for New Englanders and first responders. *First Church in Cambridge contributed \$2,000 for the effort - canceling \$200,000 in debt - by donations made by members.* Families in seven states plus first responders around the country will soon be receiving letters telling them that their medical debt has been forgiven. A yellow envelope bearing a UCC logo is on the way to each benefiting family, with a letter naming contributing congregations and organizations. It reads: "You may never enter the doors of one of our churches, but we are the United Church of Christ and we love you. ... Most importantly, you are beloved by God and your debt has been forgiven." At an October 25 news conference, local, regional, and national UCC leaders announced that a Conference-wide fundraising campaign in Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island, birthed before the pandemic, along with a contribution from a national ministry of the UCC, raised over \$200,000. The gifts were sent to the New York-based nonprofit "RIP Medical Debt."

No chant here, but two fine pieces, one by American Indian composer Shruthi Rajesekar and the other by Boston composer Richard Clark. The texts are unusual. One is the from the record of Senator Elizabeth Warren being shushed on the Senate floor by Republicans. The other is a poem by Chris Kinsley about the Biblical story of the Samaritan woman at the well, but turned around to offer the viewpoint of the woman herself. You hear her own inner voice of the fear of being judged, embarrassed and condemned. In Jesus she finds no judgment and condemnation, but rather acceptance and love. There is an introduction by the two composers and the music director of Seraphim, Jennifer Lester.

Matins of the Feast of the Holy Trinity, sung by Psallentes

The piece is "Invitatorium: Deum Verum." The music alternates between medieval chant and organum. The ensemble Psallentes was founded in 2000 by singer and conductor Hendrik Vanden Abeele. The ensemble seeks out plainchant and associated polyphony from various historical periods. Particular attention is paid to plainchant of the late Middle Ages and Renaissance.
