## TODAY'S HAPPENINGS AT FIRST CHURCH

### **RECLAIMING JESUS: Why? How? And Why Now? Final Session Today, 10:00 a.m., Harter Room**

It often feels difficult in this day and age to speak of our faith when we are outside of the religious place we might attend. This can be especially true for Christians, when it seems that Christianity with a capital C has been co-opted/defined by a more conservative or even radicalized evangelical right. Jim Wallis's new book, *Christ in Crisis, Why We Need to Reclaim Jesus*, and his podcast, "Reclaiming Jesus Now" examine our current political crisis, which Wallis calls a "deeply spiritual and dangerously moral one." He believes that we have become disconnected from Jesus, and suggests that "it is time to return to him, to come home." With Wallis as our guide, together we will consider some ways to find our way back and "reclaim Jesus." Led by Rev. Alex Steinert Evoy and others.

### **STRENGTH IN THE STRUGGLE: RENEWING SPIRITS FOR THE WORK OF CLIMATE JUSTICE**

**Tomorrow, January 27, 10:00 a.m., Quincy Point Congregational Church, 444 Washington St., Quincy** In cooperation with Fore River Residents Against the Compressor Station (FRRACS), local faith leaders invite interfaith colleagues, members of faith and spiritual communities, and all people of good will to a public spiritual witness for climate justice. Enbridge Corporation has begun construction in Weymouth on a dangerous and dirty fracked-gas compressor station. Like Joshua in the Hebrew Bible story, we will sing, pray and march along the “wall” of Enbridge’s fence-line, proclaiming that all walls of injustice must fall. We will share grief, honor and support frontline leaders, and renew our spirits as participants in Beloved Community - local and global, human and more-than-human. Gather at Quincy Point Congregational Church at 10:00 a.m. for coffee, orientation, song and prayer/meditation. Then carpool to the construction site at 50 Bridge St., Weymouth, for a procession along the fence-line with song and multifaith prayer/expressions, concluding on the Fore River Bridge, holding signs and banners in support of FRRACS. **CLIMATE CHANGE EXHIBIT** The Harvard Museum of Natural History is presenting an ongoing exhibit entitled “Exploring the Impact of the Warming Climate on the Planet.” Drawing on the latest scientific information about our warming climate, including both its local and global effects, this multimedia exhibit includes engaging video and storm simulations, a “check your knowledge” interactive station, and a dramatic inside look at a high-tech Argo float from the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution—one of more than 4,000 deployed worldwide to monitor global oceans and climate. The museum is located at 26 Oxford Street, Cambridge.

**HOW TO CHANGE YOUR CHRISTIAN MIND Sunday, February 9, 2:00 p.m., Harter Room** In 2018, New York Times bestselling author and Harvard lecturer Michael Pollan released a new book: *How to Change Your Mind: What the New Science of Psychedelics Teaches Us about Consciousness, Dying, Addiction, Depression, and Transcendence*, opening up new questions about the role of mysticism and spiritual wellbeing in treating mental health. In conversation with this book, Harvard Divinity School student Joe Welker (MDiv '22) explores how Christianity can join in this discussion through its mystic roots, discerning the possibilities and responsibilities of integrating Christianity into the growing psychedelic movement. This is just one Christian’s story and an invitation to conversation. Following a presentation, the floor will be opened for questions and sharing of perspectives.
