WELCOME TO FIRST CHURCH IN CAMBRIDGE... Grounded in God • Growing in Community • Acting in Love

These past weeks have brought home to all of us the vital importance of working together to slow and limit the spread of Coronavirus. We know we are called to be a community of faith, not fear. We also know we are called to care for the most vulnerable in our midst, to be good stewards of our staff and resources, and to be good citizens of the wider community.

Under normal circumstances, people of faith would care for each other by drawing close together. It's what we do. It's who we are. In times of loss or threat, we respond by coming together to pray and to sing, to hug and hold each other tight.

Pandemics are different. During an outbreak such as the one we are facing now, we are called to care for each other by moving farther apart, creating a holy buffer of social distance. These are temporary measures only. They won't last forever. We will rejoice and celebrate all the more when we are able to come back together, to share stories of what it was like, to laugh, to cry, and to share hugs and handshakes again. Until then, day by day, let's hold one another in prayer.



The Holy Spirit had arrived-- God's newest gift of love!



We praise you all, O Holy Spirit, God and Christ the Son.



- For the 14 men who are finding care and residence in our First Church Shelter and for the guests of the Friday Café, who are experiencing worsening deprivation and hardship in this time of disruption; that may they know warmth, compassion, and companionship.

We pray for tranquility for immigrants who live in constant fear and anxiety. And we pray for all who are working for a just and compassionate future for immigrants and asylum seekers.
- We offer up our fears and grief, and we pray for God's strength as we combat the realities of the climate crisis. May God empower us and our leaders to take bold steps, personally and politically, to care for God's creation and for the poor around the world who are most affected by our inaction.

Prayer, Reflection, and Action Summer 2020

The following statement expresses First Church's intentions and commitments for the summer of 2020. We join with a global outcry against recent and past events of violence against black and brown persons. This statement builds on several years of concerted efforts to raise our self-awareness, build relationships, and act towards racial justice and healing. We approach this work with hearts open to listening, learning, and change.



First Church affirms that Black Lives Matter and Indigenous Lives Matter. We celebrate the gifts, presence, and leadership of persons of color within First Church and beyond. We recognize that the problem of racism is a white person's problem and that this is white people's work. Becoming an anti-racist church means that we are determined not merely to raise our consciousness of racism, but to actively call out and intentionally work for change. We do this work because we know our individual and collective spiritual health, transformation, and liberation depend on it. We do this work relying on God's help and knowing that we cannot do it alone.

In the coming weeks and months, the Staff, Executive Council, and Deacons of First Church invite you to join us in taking on a spiritual practice aimed at disrupting our complicity with white supremacy, ending our silence about police brutality and racial inequality, and acting toward real change. We invite you to commit serious energy and sacrificial love to at least two of the following levels of work:

SOUL LEVEL

Here are several ideas to deepen our self-awareness, learning and healing:

- Join summer online Faith & Life groups or book groups related to racial justice, or lead your own. Ideas in the works:
 - Reading, Listening, or Watching Groups Gather friends for a close read of Robin D'Angelo's White Fragility or Ibram X. Kendi's How To Be An Anti-Racist.
 - Commit to listening to or reading at least one black or indigenous voice each day.

 Here are some ideas. Check our website throughout the summer for updates.
 - Join a "Me and White Supremacy" Group. Follow <u>Layla Saad's 28-day workbook</u> with daily exercises and reflections for becoming an anti-racist.
 - Individual Reparations Accountability Group Support for those participating in a range of local and individual <u>reparations pledges</u> and efforts.
- Develop a practice of saying and praying their names, George Floyd. Breonna Taylor. Ahmaud Arbery. The list goes on, and on. And on. Learn the stories of their lives, not just their deaths. Say their names.
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CONGREGATIONAL LEVEL

Participate in making First Church an inclusive, anti-racist congregation:

- Familiarize yourself with lessons learned by other churches, as described in the book Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism by Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin. Register to attend an upcoming Zoom discussion of chapter 3 on Thursday, June 18, from 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. or Wednesday, July 15, from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. Email Peggy Stevens (peggy@kids4peace.org) to receive the Zoom invitation.
- Join a monthly after-church Zoom coffee hour check-in to share progress with your commitments and ideas for our shared work.

- Support, invest in, and follow the lead of Black, Indigenous, and Person of Color-led businesses, organizations, or protests, as you are able.

NATIONAL LEVEL

As Rev Dr. Otis Moss III of Trinity United Church of Christ in Chicago has said, our country is facing not one, but two pandemics: Covid-19 and "confederate Covid 1619," referring to the toxic strain of racist and white supremacist ideology that has been coursing through our church, city and nation's history since its founding on stolen land. First Church tested positive for the latter in the 1630's when our forebears held captive enslaved persons of African and Indigenous descent. We have yet to develop a vaccine, and its effects are still evident to this day. We are all carriers, whether we know it or not. We all need constant vigilance, lest we share it unwittingly. We are all in need of healing. The collective treatment includes a daily regimen of prayer, action and reflection. The Spirit is upon us now, calling us each to respond.

STAFFING UPDATE First Church, rejoice! Pastoral Associate Lexi Boudreuax will be with us, not only through the summer as planned, but through the coming program year as well! Given Covid-19-related circumstances, she will not be doing full-time chaplaincy at MGH next year. This unexpected shift has given Lexi and us an exciting opportunity to continue our work and ministry together. Her primary areas of focus will be: 1) expanding our online ministry and worship offerings, 2) adult spiritual formation, 3) pastoral care and 4) occasional preaching and worship leadership. In August, we will also welcome new Pastoral Associate Jaz Buchanan, a third-year Harvard Divinity School student. In addition, Sarah Higginbotham and Kate Layzer will be working increased hours in the coming year—all of this while staying within, and even under, our budget. God is good!

PLANS FOR A PHASED RE-OPENING Governor Baker has announced the loosening of restrictions for houses of worship in the state of Massachusetts. The opportunity to re-open is good news; however, the continuing threat of COVID-19 obliges us to re-open thoughtfully and carefully. As a community of faith that seeks to protect the health and safety of each and every member of the body of Christ, we have decided to delay any changes to our current model of live-streamed worship until at least July. In July and August, we will experiment with inviting a small number of members to attend worship in-person to participate as lay leaders in the online worship for the wider community. This will allow us to begin to get comfortable with our health and safety protocols, so that we can carefully prepare for the time when more and more of us will be able to gather. It will also provide the opportunity for you to see more people leading our worship. Any changes we make to our current practices are dependent on public health data and COVID-19 case counts in Massachusetts. Our plans might need change to assure the safety of all. We hope that this summer will bring new ways of being together as a church and provide a time of exploration and inspiration in this season of uncertainty. It may be a while before we can all see each other again on Sunday mornings, but that remains our goal. With God's help, we'll get there when the time is right.

Sunday, June 14: On Fixing Health Care

Bill Hsiao is an economist who teaches at Harvard School of Public Health and has studied health care systems for more than forty years. Besides the State of Vermont, he designed reforms of national health care systems for nine countries. Presently he serves on the Governor's Commission on Healthy Californians for All at the invitation of California Governor Gavin Newsom. He wrote an article in the January/February 2020 Foreign Affairs called *How to Fix American Health Care: What Other Countries Can—and Can't—Teach the United States*.

Laurie Burt, former commissioner of the MA Department of Environmental Protection and vice chair of the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), currently offers independent strategic advice on clean energy, climate and environmental policies to foundations, non-profits, businesses and government throughout the country. Laurie has practiced environmental law for over 30 years and serves on many boards including the Union for Concerned Scientists, CERES, and the American Repertory Theater.
