These past weeks have brought home to all of us the vital importance of working together to slow and limit the spread of Coronavirus. We know we are called to be a community of faith, not fear. We also know we are called to care for the most vulnerable in our midst, to be good stewards of our staff and resources, and to be good citizens of the wider community.

Under normal circumstances, people of faith would care for each other by drawing close together. It's what we do. It's who we are. In times of loss or threat, we respond by coming together to pray and to sing, to hug and hold each other tight.

Pandemics are different. During an outbreak such as the one we are facing now, we are called to care for each other by moving farther apart, creating a holy buffer of social distance. We do this not only for our own safety and the safety of the people around us, but in loving stewardship to our wider world.

Even when apart, we are not alone. God is with us, in every heartbeat, every breath: strengthening, comforting, and upholding us. Christ is with us, walking beside us, sharing our trials, speaking peace to our fears. The Spirit is with us, uniting us one to another across the barrier of physical distance.

These are temporary measures only. They won't last forever. We will rejoice and celebrate all the more when we are able to come back together, to share stories of what it was like, to laugh, to cry, and to share hugs and handshakes again. Until then, day by day, let's hold one another in prayer.





YOUR PRAYERS ARE REQUESTED



STAFFING UPDATE First Church, rejoice! Pastoral Associate Lexi Boudreuax will be with us, not only through the summer as planned, but through the coming program year as well! Given Covid-19-related circumstances, she will not be doing full-time chaplaincy at MGH next year. This unexpected shift has given Lexi and us an exciting opportunity to continue our work and ministry together. Her primary areas of focus will be: 1) expanding our online ministry and worship offerings, 2) adult spiritual formation, 3) pastoral care and 4) occasional preaching and worship leadership. In August, we will also welcome new Pastoral Associate Jaz Buchanan, a third-year Harvard Divinity School student. In addition, Sarah Higginbotham and Kate Layzer will be working increased hours in the coming year—all of this while staying within, and even under, our budget. God is good!

PLANS FOR A PHASED RE-OPENING Governor Baker has announced the loosening of restrictions for houses of worship in the state of Massachusetts. The opportunity to re-open is good news; however, the continuing threat of COVID-19 obliges us to re-open thoughtfully and carefully. As a community of faith that seeks to protect the health and safety of each and every member of the body of Christ, we have decided to delay any changes to our current model of live-streamed worship until at least July. In July and August, we will experiment with inviting a small number of members to attend worship in-person to participate as lay leaders in the online worship for the wider community. This will allow us to begin to get comfortable with our health and safety protocols, so that we can carefully prepare for the time when more and more of us will be able to gather. It will also provide the opportunity for you to see more people leading our worship. Any changes we make to our current practices are dependent on public health data and COVID-19 case counts in Massachusetts. Our plans might need change to assure the safety of all. We hope that this summer will bring new ways of being together as a church and provide a time of exploration and inspiration in this season of uncertainty. It may be a while before we can all see each other again on Sunday mornings, but that remains our goal. With God's help, we'll get there when the time is right.



Sunday, May 17: On Public Health and Leadership

Ed Baker, former Assistant Surgeon General in the US Public Health Service and former Director of CDC's Public Health Practice Program Office, currently serves as Adjunct Professor in Health Policy and Management at UNC and Adjunct Professor of Environmental Health at Harvard Chan School. Ed is a board-certified physician and was trained in epidemiology in the CDC's Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS) and at Harvard School of Public Health.

Sunday, June 14: On Fixing Health Care

Bill Hsiao is an economist who teaches at Harvard School of Public Health and has studied health care systems for more than forty years. Besides the State of Vermont, he designed reforms of national health care systems for nine countries. Presently he serves on the Governor's Commission on Healthy Californians for All at the invitation of California Governor Gavin Newsom. He wrote an article in the January/February 2020 Foreign Affairs called *How to Fix American Health Care: What Other Countries Can—and Can't—Teach the United States.*

"A REQUIEM FOR AHMAUD ARBERY" Sunday, June 21, 11:00 a.m., via live-stream worship On May 17, Rev. Otis Moss III, of the 8,500-member Trinity United Church of Christ in Chicago, offered a powerful 25-minute multimedia sermon about the recent death of Ahmaud Arbery and about our nation's appalling history of violence against black and brown bodies. It is a profound lamentation and testimony that speaks the truth in love to the entrenched power of white supremacy. Ahmuad Arbery. Breonna Taylor. George Floyd. These names and lives join so many others who have died in acts of racial terror on lynching trees, on streets, in parks. In lieu of a traditional sermon on June 21, we will share a recording of Rev. Moss's reflections, bearing witness together to the daily reality of violence and terror against people of color in America. A Zoom discussion will be held after the service.

The Solemnity of Pentecost (High Mass), St. John Cantius, Chicago:

The priests and brothers at this Catholic parish are a religious community that lives together as a family. The musicians are located in a separate area of the church. Members of the congregation are still not allowed to attend mass but currently may enter the church during the week to pray. If you've been listening to this mass weekly you may have noticed that during the Easter season the chant Vidi Aquam has been sung at the beginning of the mass during aspersion, the dispensation of holy water by sprinkling. This past Sunday there were evidently parishioners standing outside the entrance to the church, and you will see the priest walking to the doorway during the singing of the Vidi Aquam chant to include them in the aspersion rite. You will hear hymns to the Holy Spirit, a striking choral setting of Psalm 104, and a motet by Thomas Tallis sung by four men in the resonant space of St. Mark's Cathedral. The opening prayer is very powerful, obviously meant to address the current situation in America regarding the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis and the protests being staged daily. This meditative choral service is a Seattle tradition. Before the pandemic hundreds attended, and sometimes following there was an organ recital that people stayed to enjoy. Thousands still listen weekly to it broadcast on a local FM station.
