These past weeks have brought home to all of us the vital importance of working together to slow and limit the spread of Coronavirus. We know we are called to be a community of faith, not fear. We also know we are called to care for the most vulnerable in our midst, to be good stewards of our staff and resources, and to be good citizens of the wider community.

Under normal circumstances, people of faith would care for each other by drawing close together. It's what we do. It's who we are. In times of loss or threat, we respond by coming together to pray and to sing, to hug and hold each other tight.

Pandemics are different. During an outbreak such as the one we are facing now, we are called to care for each other by moving farther apart, creating a holy buffer of social distance. These are temporary measures only. They won't last forever. We will rejoice and celebrate all the more when we are able to come back together, to share stories of what it was like, to laugh, to cry, and to share hugs and handshakes again. Until then, day by day, let's hold one another in prayer.



CARLYLE STEWART, COMMUNITY MINISTER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE Good news, Church! Our recent Pastoral Associate Carlyle Stewart will be back this fall in a new grant-funded role as our Community Minister for Racial Justice. Thanks to funding from our <u>BU School of Theology Creative Callings Project</u> grant, Carlyle will be with us, albeit remotely, through January 2021. The part-time role (6 hours/week) will allow Carlyle to plan and lead three First Church online 'townhall' style meetings in September, November and January, with some involving partners from the wider community. He will also be leading weekly theological reflection sessions on biblical and spiritual themes related to our work of becoming an anti-racist church. We celebrate

this work of the Spirit in our midst and on our ongoing partnership with Carlyle's whose gifts are perfectly suited for this needed work of spiritual and theological grounding.

SUMMER SCHEDULE Worship begins at 10:00 a.m. through August. We are offering a mix of livestream and pre-recorded worship. We're excited to continue experimenting with the possibilities surrounding virtual services, and we hope you will continue to worship with us online until we can all be together again in the sanctuary. The church building continues to be locked, but is staffed by sextons. We are offering building access from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m., Monday - Friday. If you need access to the building, please email Director of Operations Kirsten Manville and give prior notice of the day and time you would like to enter. This is both for contact tracing purposes and also to let the sextons know to expect you. Office Assistant Bruce Dillenbeck will also be in the church office for a few hours every Tuesday and Friday afternoon throughout the summer, answering the phone, sorting the mail, and doing other tasks that cannot be done from home.

PLANNING FOR THE FALL Living through a pandemic is not something most of us could have predicted, or even thought of as a possibility. We have all been learning as we go—adjusting to this new way of interacting, doing, and being. One thing has become clear over these last months: this pandemic will be with us for a long time yet. In recognition of this, First Church staff are homing in on a structure for our Sunday schedule that provides remote programming, worship, and fellowship/connection. If at some point this fall, we find that limited in-person gatherings seem feasible, we will plan to "add on" in-person components, but not alter the remote access. Remote will be our default; in-person will be an added bonus. We are working to ensure that, even though we need to remain physically distanced, our connection as a congregation remains strong and is felt deeply by each of you. We look forward to sharing more information about fall worship and programming in future bulletins and in the Fall issue of EVENT.

BECOMING AN ANTI-RACIST CHURCH Prayer, Reflection, and Action Summer 2020

The following statement expresses First Church's intentions and commitments for the summer of 2020. We join with a global outcry against recent and past events of violence against black and brown persons. This statement builds on several years of concerted efforts to raise our self-awareness, build relationships, and act towards racial justice and healing. We approach this work with hearts open to listening, learning, and change.



First Church affirms that Black Lives Matter and Indigenous Lives Matter.

We celebrate the gifts, presence, and leadership of persons of color within First Church and beyond.

We recognize that the problem of racism is a white person's problem and that this is white people's work.

Becoming an anti-racist church means that we are determined not merely to raise our consciousness of racism, but to actively call out and intentionally work for change.

We do this work because we know our individual and collective spiritual health, transformation, and liberation depend on it.

We do this work relying on God's help and knowing that we cannot do it alone.

We invite you to commit serious energy and sacrificial love to at least two of these levels of work.

SOUL LEVEL

Say Their Names. North Carolina Laureate Jaki Shelton Green mourns George Floyd and other lives that were taken with <u>Oh My Brother, a work of spoken word and images</u>.

Learn more about how to act on your belief that <u>Black Lives Matter</u>.

CONGREGATIONAL LEVEL

REPORT ON GREATER BOSTON INTERFAITH'S ORGANIZATION'S (GBIO) RACIAL JUSTICE

CAMPAIGN Congrats to the 2000+ leaders in GBIO member institutions and beyond who "put feet to their faith." They acted in this critical moment to push forward a holistic racial justice agenda, and our collective work has helped move key legislation into joint conference committees where final bills are being negotiated between the House and Senate. The bills in joint committee include:

- POLICE REFORM. A bill on comprehensive police reform including enhanced police training with certification/decertification through POST, reform to qualified immunity, and statutory limits on excessive use of force
- HEALTHCARE. A bill that expands telehealth, makes progress on mental health parity, and provides temporary relief from surprise out-of-network medical billing
- HOUSING. A bill that extends the moratorium on evictions/foreclosures for 12 months and provides relief for small and nonprofit landlords

We will monitor as the bills in conference committee proceed and send action alerts as needed. Please see <u>THIS LINK</u> for a full report and summary of the GBIO's 2020 Racial Justice Campaign. IDM teams and congregational core teams are following up with their members for relational meetings and evaluation. SUPPORT FOR LEBANON Earlier this week an explosion in Beirut injured over 4,000 Lebanese people with at least 100 fatalities. Prayers and aid are needed to help recovery, and to begin rebuilding destroyed sections of downtown. The Red Cross of Lebanon is accepting donations at <u>redcross.org.lb</u>

TAKE TWO MINUTES TO ACT FOR POLICE REFORM The policing reform omnibus bill, still in legislative committee, diverts away from what Black and Latinx people most impacted by incarceration are calling for. It is not good enough! Read <u>Families for Justice As Healing's statement</u> on their <u>website</u>. You will see suggestions for action, including support for No Cost Calls from prisons. Sheriffs are exerting pressure to oppose this humanitarian bill. A script for e-mailing or calling your legislators is provided on the website.
