



ABOUT THE HALLELUJAH CHORUS



Today, as on Easters past, we joyfully sing out a beloved masterpiece that for many is synonymous with Easter celebration: the famous "Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's oratorio *Messiah*. This year, however, we do so with an awareness that this piece has a complex history. As we are learning, some scholars believe Messiah contains elements of anti-Jewish hostility. The "Hallelujah Chorus" has come under particular scrutiny, leading to symposia and media coverage on the possible undertones of the piece, given where it falls in the oratorio. You may read more here. Even as we sing out with joy today, we are committed to learning more and considering how we can hold

a painful and complex legacy alongside our appreciation of iconic artworks from the past.






Invitation to Contribute to Coffee Hour
