"Forgotten Souls of Tory Row: Remembering the Enslaved People of Brattle Street" Bottle Tree at First Church
With gratitude to our partners at History Cambridge and the Black Coral Inc. artist collaborative, a bottle tree from "Forgotten Souls of Tory Row: Remembering the Enslaved People of Brattle Street" will be on view on our front lawn from now through Juneteenth, June 19. The installation honors the enslaved adults and children who lived and worked on this land, as well as those whose labor on Caribbean plantations helped finance the grand homes of white Tory Row elites. The bottle tree tradition originated in West Africa and was brought to the United States by enslaved people. The tradition was

passed down through generations, marking the survival of a

distinctive blue bottles were placed on trees to capture the


Fabric Dyeing and Stitching Workshop


Reparations Conversations Sundays, June 4 and 11, 9:30 - 10:15 a.m. Harter Room and via Zoom

Please join us for two conversations about First Church's journey thus far regarding reparations and where the Spirit may be leading us next. We'll talk about the communities most harmed by our history of church members enslaving in the congregation and our painful response to the work of abolition in previous centuries, as well as the living legacy of slavery in the forms of Jim Crow segregation, the war on drugs, redlining, and mass incarceration.



We'll update the congregation on the Reparations Fund and the work of the Collective, which is convened by First Church member Karlene Griffiths Sekou. We'll also share information about efforts to engage in repair with the Indigenous communities most harmed by us—the Wabanaki, Massachussett (Wampanoag and Nipmuc) peoples—and plans for learning & action opportunities in the Fall. We'll talk about the spiritual practice of reparations, guided in part by the book Reparations: A Christian Call For Repentance and Repair, which asks what Christians are called to do regarding white supremacy's cultural theft of truth, power, and wealth, and why our engagement matters.

We'll reflect on how God is calling First Church to engage in this powerful and life-changing work.



During an early May 9:30 Adult Formation program, members of the First Church Archives Team offered a presentation about our First Church archives, which include sermons, records, and historical documents. A few date back to the 1630's; the most valuable are held at Harvard Libraries or in safety deposit boxes. We also hold items that have no connection with First Church's own

history or record. At our June 25 Special Congregational Meeting, our Assets Research Team and Archives Team will jointly recommend the deaccessioning and sale of our non-First Church related archival materials. If you missed the session in early May, or would like to learn more, please come to a "watch party" to view a

portion of the session and for background about what we will be voting on at the June 25 meeting.

Children's Sunday, June 11

On the second Sunday of June, it is our custom to celebrate the children's formation programs of the church in a Children's Sunday worship service. We are led in liturgy by younger voices, and we recognize our 4th graders with their own Bibles as they "graduate" from Godly Play. We lift up the volunteer teachers and helpers who make our Church School run, and we take time to ask wondering questions about the stories central to our faith and practice.

Our Morning Worship on June 18 will lift up themes of freedom and liberation with a special focus on Juneteenth, which commemorates the abolition of slavery. The service will feature a "first look" at our emerging community fabric art project:

Wade in the Water: Remembering and Honoring Enslaved
Persons at First Church. We will offer a public reading of names
and a commemoration of all the enslaved persons associated



with First Church over the years. Members of the Lloyd family—descendants of Tony, Cuba and Darby Vassal, who are listed in our records—will be with us. Dan Smith and Egypt Lloyd will share in a reflection and time of blessing. Worship with us as we wade in the water together with generations of ancestors and descendants in this service of remembrance, repentance, relationship-building, and repair.
