COMMUNITY PRAYERS

Prayer for Israel and Palestine

We pray for an end to the war and the heartwrenching, horrific violence in Israel and Palestine. We pray for all hostages and their families; for those living in daily fear for their and their loved ones' safety; and for all who are grieving the hundreds of deaths of Israelis, Palestinians, and others in Israel, Gaza, and around the world, including members of our congregation who have close ties with people who are currently in the area.

We decry the violent Hamas attacks and terrorism in all forms. We pray for redoubled diplomatic efforts to address underlying systemic justice issues in the region, including the existing humanitarian crisis in Gaza and the ongoing occupation of Palestinian territories. We continue to pray for a just peace in Israel and Palestine and throughout the region. We also pray for Jews and Muslims, nearby and around the world, who are facing increased threats and acts of anti-Semitic and anti-Muslim discrimination, hatred, and violence.

- We pray for Marianne Jensen and her ongoing healing following recent surgery.
- We give thanks for the life of Brian O'Donovan, who died last week from glioblastoma and who was celebrated here in a service of music, poetry, and heartfelt reflection on Wednesday.
- We pray for Jodi Melichar and her family, including husband Bappu and son Kiran, as they mourn the loss of her father Dr. Bob Melichar, who died recently after a long struggle with Alzheimer's.
- We pray for Alice Kidder, who has been re-hospitalized this week for various serious medical issues.
- We pray for Poppy and Brent Coffin as Poppy recovers from fractured wrist and vertebrae following a bad fall
- We pray for Gaylen Morgan, who is grateful for our cards and prayers, and who is recovering well at home from vestibular surgery.
- We pray for Karen Anne Zee, who is recovering at home from spinal surgery following a fall.
- We pray for all who are in treatment for cancer and other ongoing health challenges: Carol Wilson-Braun, who is managing slow-progressing ALS; Jim Rae, Ami Brenner's father; Ellen Smith, Devin Hansen's aunt; Judith Semmler, Alice Napoleon Jones's mother; Karen Anne Zee's daughter Becky Collet, and her sons-in-law, Denis Collet and Stewart Bailey; Beth and Polly, Ann McCann's sisters.

COMMUNITY PRAYERS

- We continue to pray for the health of our democracy in the wake of the House Speaker's removal last week. May our elected representatives find moral courage, may the Holy Spirit protect and guide our social movements for justice, and may we each continue to do our small part to make God's kin-dom in this time.
- We pray for workers who are unemployed, laid off, or displaced. We pray for immigrants waiting for work permits or desperate for work, and for union workers who are striking for better pay and working conditions.
- We continue to pray for all impacted by and recovering from recent natural and climate related disasters – the earthquake in Morocco, wildfires in Maui, floods in Leominster and Libya. We continue to pray for our rapidly warming planet and for redoubled efforts to reduce fossil fuel emissions.
- We pray for all those impacted by the violence of war and political upheaval, including in Ukraine, Sudan, and Haiti. As we prepare to welcome two refugees through the WelcomeCorps, we pray for all political and climate refugees and migrants who make often life-threatening border crossings over land and open water.
- We pray for the wellbeing and safety of our trans and gender non-conforming siblings as they face the impact of vitriolic public discourse and of state laws that restrict and criminalize transgender health care, personal expression, and wider LGBTQ+ education.
- We pray for those most affected by changes in reproductive rights: for all those struggling with the moral and political complexities of pregnancy and childbearing, and for patients and healthcare providers who are unable to give and receive care in their own states.
- We pray for the 14 men finding sustenance and protection in our First Church Shelter; and we pray for the guests of the Friday Café, who are finding resources and listening ears.

REGATHERING SEASON AT FIRST CHURCH

Debt Retirement Appeal September 20 Update

As was reported by Associate Treasurer Jim Cairns at our Regathering Luncheon, First Church currently has \$301,000 pledged towards our total goal of \$450,000. When we shared an update in July, a few members of the congregation made a “match” challenge of \$50,000 to encourage new and accelerated pledges to help pay down the debt more quickly. As of today, \$230,000 has been pledged to be paid in 2023, which is an increase of \$110,000 since July. We have more than met the match! If all the funds pledged for this year are paid by December 31, we will have cut five years off the loan repayment period and saved over \$63,000 of interest payments.



This is a significant step in our efforts to improve our financial sustainability. However, we still have a way to go to fully retire this loan. At the moment, we have \$71,000 pledged to be paid in 2024 and 2025. We need at least another \$100,000 in pledges for 2024 if we are to maintain our momentum. So, if you have not yet made a pledge we encourage you to prayerfully consider what you might be able to do.
