





Our Advent Banners

We are happy to bring back our Advent banners, depicting images designed by Vermont artist Janet McKenzie. Thanks to a generous donation from Laurie Williams and Andrea Seek, the Deacons were pleased to support this project in 2020 as part of our ongoing efforts to lift up historically and Biblically underrepresented images and voices of women and persons of color. This week, in addition to ***The Visitation***, we re-introduce McKenzie's ***Annunciation***, which references the story of the Angel Gabriel's appearance to Mary, telling her that she will give birth to a son and that his name will be called Jesus.

Give Me Light in the Darkness... Our Advent Song

Our Peace hymn is based on "Give Me Birds at the Dawning," written by Betsy Binstock and arranged by Peter & Mary Alice Amidon, from *Twenty-five Anthems for Interfaith and Community Choirs* ©2016, Amidon Music Publishing. The words have been adapted to fit the Advent season.

The musical score is written for three voices: Soprano, Alto, and Bass. It is in the key of D major (two sharps) and 3/4 time. The lyrics are: "Give me light in the dark-ness, light in the dark-ness, Give me hope* in the wait - ing, hope* in the wait - ing, light in the dark - ness to sing my soul a - wake. hope* in the wait - ing to sing my soul a - wake." The score includes a six-measure rest at the beginning of each line and a six-measure rest at the beginning of the second system.

COMMUNITY PRAYERS

Prayer for Israel and Palestine

We give thanks for the recent pause in fighting and exchange of hostages, even as we pray now for further breakthroughs, ceasefires, a return of all hostages, and an end to the war and ongoing heartache in Israel and Palestine. We pray for all hostages and their families; for those living in daily fear for their and their loved ones' safety; and for all who are grieving the thousands of deaths of Palestinians, Israelis, and others in Israel, Gaza, and around the world, including members of our congregation who have close ties with people who are currently in the area.

We decry the horrifically violent Hamas attacks against Israel on October 7. We decry violence against civilians, including deprivation of basic needs for people living and being evacuated inside of Gaza. We pray for redoubled diplomatic efforts to address the already devastating humanitarian crisis in Gaza and the ongoing occupation of Palestinian territories. We continue to pray for a just peace in Palestine and Israel and throughout the region. We also pray for Jews and Muslims, nearby and around the world, who are facing increased threats and acts of anti-Semitic and anti-Muslim discrimination, hatred, and violence.

We continue to pray for ourselves, that we will be faithful, compassionate, and open to God's love and leading, and to all whom we encounter through these tension-filled times. Across whatever division or disagreement, may our words and deeds seek to honor the humanity and God-given dignity of every human being.

- We pray for those most affected by changes in reproductive rights: for all those struggling with the moral and political complexities of pregnancy and childbearing, and for patients and healthcare providers who are unable to give and receive care in their own states.
- We pray for the 14 men finding sustenance and protection in our First Church Shelter; and we pray for the guests of the Friday Café, who are finding resources and listening ears.
