Statement of Prayer and Concern for Palestine and Israel From the Executive Leadership of the Southern New England Conference of the United Church of Christ (SNEUCC), February 28, 2024

To all that is holy:

We the faith leaders of the Southern New England Conference lift your children in Palestine and Israel in prayer through the pain, suffering, and unnecessary violence and unfathomable loss of life since October 7, 2023.

We lift the families of those who are grieving to you, God, families broken apart by death, relocation, and continued hostage realities.

We lift the Palestinian rage and pain, the suffering and genocide.

We lift the echoes of hurt caused by conflation of State, and people group, and commit to s howing up against antisemitism in our local communities, and beyond.

We commit to a future where Palestinian people can live joyfully and freely in their faiths, and will work for that reality in our communities, and beyond.

We commit to a future where Jewish people can live joyfully and freely in their faith, and will work for that reality in our communities, and beyond.

We pray for pastoral leaders seeking to make sense of what is happening, and how to show up in their own settings for peace.

We pray for communities here, holding close the pain of what is happening abroad, and watching each newscast with fear and trembling for our collective future.

In times like these, witnessing the Holy Land in turmoil for siblings of all sister-faiths, we cling to our faith. We remember that you are a God of those who are oppressed, you are Just, and you have pointed one way to wholeness and healing of the world through your son Jesus Christ.

We refuse the binaries of "us" and "them," of theological manifest destiny, of political division, and God we know that there are people of every faith, ethnicity, and nationality, in pain and trauma, carrying the weight of generational trauma, the truth of their own experience, and the understandings of narratives generally produced by systems of power.

God, we know it is not possible to speak for everyone, nor should we try. It is not possible to shy away from pain, though we can mitigate impact.

To all that is holy, hear our prayer, and keep our hearts open to your spirit teaching us the way of Love. God hear our prayer, and help us advocate for peace and justice, here and abroad.






Aging with Grace Monthly Meeting Tuesday, March 19, 3:00 - 4:15 p.m. Harter Room and <u>via Zoom</u>

LOOKING AHEAD

First Church Welcome Corps Team Update

Formed almost one year ago, the First Church and Friends Welcome Corps Team has been preparing and waiting for our matched Welcome Corps refugees, Nuro and Idle, to arrive. The team recently learned that they are delayed indefinitely for unknown reasons. While we have little insight into the continued stalled status of Nuro and Idle, the context here in Massachusetts has greatly changed since we first started this effort, and even more so since we started waiting for a match in September.



As you know, the Commonwealth is experiencing an extreme migrant crisis, and the Governor has not only declared a State of Emergency, but has recently called on churches to aid in the resettling of migrants. There has been extensive coverage by local news of the role of area churches, and we would like to join that effort. We do not feel comfortable simply sitting on the sidelines with a wealth of financial and volunteer resources that can be mobilized now to help struggling migrants already here.

Our Welcome Corps Team has decided to put our match status "on hold" so that we can explore how First Church can use its resources in a relevant and engaged way to support migrants already in our community. We are actively researching connections in this sphere, with some ideas including:

- Joining other area churches who are currently supporting newly-arrived migrant families living in shelters;
- Working with the Somali Development Center (with which we had already connected);
- Partnering with MIRA, IFSI, or other local refugee agencies;
- Exploring how we could support the emergency shelter opened in the old East Cambridge Registry of Deeds building that needs assistance to remain open more hours.

We know this is a big change for all of us, but we are looking forward with enthusiasm to helping with the migrant crisis currently unfolding here at home.
