COMMUNITY PRAYERS

- We pray for the family and friends of longtime First Church member Alice Kidder, who died peacefully on March 10, surrounded by family and following an extended time of declining health.
- We pray for Claire Morgan's mother Dana Hunt, who will have surgery tomorrow as a part of her pancreatic cancer treatment.
- We pray for Mike Stevens, who is recovering from aortic valve replacement surgery.
- We celebrate the birth of Brent and Poppy Coffin's grandchild, Shiloh Grace Hurst, born on March 14, and we pray for the family as they welcome Shiloh into the world. We continue to pray for Brent and Poppy as Poppy experiences a significant decline in her struggle with Alzheimer's.
- We pray for all who are in treatment for cancer and other ongoing health challenges: Carol Wilson-Braun, who is managing ALS; Carter West, who is experiencing a chronic neurological disorder; Dana Hunt, Claire Morgan's mother; Jim Rae, Ami Brenner's father; Ellen Smith, Devin Hansen's aunt; Judith Semmler, Alice Napoleon Jones's mother; Karen Anne Zee's daughter Becky Collet and her son-in-law Stewart Bailey; Beth and Polly, Ann McCann's sisters; Lisa DiNardo's friend Graziella Macchetta; and Abby Shuman's uncle Barry.
- We pray for the people of Baltimore as they recover from the collapse of the Francis Scott Key bridge this past Tuesday. We pray especially for the families of the six construction workers who are presumed dead.
- We pray for the families, friends, and loved ones of the 139 people killed, as well as for those injured, in a deadly shooting and fire in Moscow.
- We pray for the many families seeking emergency shelter in cities and towns across our state.
- We continue to pray for all who are recovering from recent natural and climate related disasters. We pray for our rapidly warming planet and for redoubled efforts to reduce fossil fuel emissions.
- We pray for the people of the Democratic Republic of Congo, where ongoing armed conflicts have led to more than 6 million people killed and more than 5 million people displaced from their homes. We pray also for those who have experienced devastating incidents of gender-based violence during the conflicts.
- We pray for all those impacted by the violence of war and political upheaval, throughout the Middle East, in Ukraine, and in Sudan. This week, we pray especially for the people of Haiti, given the heart-wrenching turmoil and gang-related violence leading to the near-collapse of the government and human services sector.
- We pray for political and climate refugees and migrants who make often life-threatening border crossings over land and open water. We pray for wisdom and justice to prevail as our court system tackles issues of immigration in its rulings.
- We pray for the wellbeing and safety of our trans and gender non-conforming siblings as they face the experience of vitriolic public discourse and of state laws that restrict and criminalize transgender health care, personal expression, and wider LGBTQ+ education.

COMMUNITY PRAYERS

- We continue to pray for those most affected by changes in reproductive rights: for all those struggling with the moral and political complexities of pregnancy and childbearing, and for patients and healthcare providers who are unable to give and receive care in their own states.
- We pray for the 14 men finding sustenance and protection in our First Church Shelter; and we pray for the guests of the Friday Café, who are finding resources and listening ears.

Prayer for Israel and Palestine

As the war in Gaza and Israel continues, and as the threat of famine in Gaza looms, our hearts cry out in prayer. With the death of 1400 Israelis and over 31,000 Palestinians so far, we pray for an end to the war and immediate de-escalation of tensions in the region that are threatening a wider and more lasting conflict. We decry the horrifically violent Hamas attacks against Israel on October 7, as well as the disproportionate use of force by the Israeli government and military.

We hold that every person is made in God's image and that every life is precious. We pray for the safe return of all hostages. We pray for redoubled diplomatic efforts to address the already devastating humanitarian crisis in Gaza and the ongoing occupation of Palestinian territories. We continue to pray for a just peace in Palestine and Israel and throughout the region. We also pray for Jews and Muslims, nearby and around the world, who are facing increased threats and acts of anti-Semitic and anti-Muslim discrimination, hatred, and violence.

We continue to pray for ourselves, that we will be courageous, faithful, compassionate, and open to God's love and leading, and to all whom we encounter through these tension-filled times. Across whatever division or disagreement, may our words and deeds seek to honor the humanity and God-given dignity of every human being.

About the Hallelujah Chorus

Today, as on Easters past, we joyfully sing out a beloved masterpiece that for many is synonymous with Easter celebration: the famous "Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's oratorio *Messiah*. We do so, however, with an awareness that this piece has a complex history. Some scholars believe *Messiah* contains elements of anti-Jewish hostility. The "Hallelujah Chorus" has come under particular scrutiny, leading to symposia and media coverage on the possible undertones of the piece, given where it falls in the oratorio. You may read more <u>here</u>. Even as we sing out with joy today,



we are committed to learning more and considering how we can hold a painful and complex legacy alongside our appreciation of iconic artworks from the past.

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT MINISTRY

Opportunities to Help

We have some exciting news to share about a new initiative within our First Church Refugee Ministry (formerly known as Welcome Corps) – and we need your help!

We are collaborating with the recently-opened MA Safety Net Family Shelter located in the Registry of Deeds (RoD) Building in East Cambridge. This shelter is already at capacity and is housing 200 people from 60 families, all new migrants to the US. You may recall that the Welcome Corps refugees with whom we were matched have been indefinitely delayed. Given this, we decided to shift our efforts to support migrants already in our community during the current crisis and to utilize our resources in a relevant and engaged way.

After meeting with the East Cambridge Shelter, City, and State staff, we have two projects that we are taking on right away. Please note that details may change as we continue to collaborate with the East Cambridge Shelter.

Teen Room

The East Cambridge Shelter has a space it would like to dedicate to its twenty kids aged 12 - 18. We plan to create a cool, cozy, and productive space for schoolwork, hang-out time, and fun. This will be an immediate and time-limited project. We need volunteers who are interested in:

- connecting with Shelter leadership to plan the space;
- brainstorm what should be there;
- source, purchase, and deliver items;
- and finally, set-up the space.

Welcome Center at FCC

The Shelter is closed from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on weekdays, leaving guests to find places to go during the chilly days. We would like to welcome them to our church building by providing Margaret Jewett Hall as a multi-purpose space to meet some of their needs, starting with a few Tuesday mornings in April. We need volunteers who can provide:

- greeting and general support during our open hours
- meal support sourcing, buying, serving and cleaning up lunch
- translation in Haitian-Creole, Spanish, and French
- tutoring for ESOL (English Speakers of Other Languages)
- job coaching
- childcare for little ones not enrolled in school
