- In the midst of increasing solidarity protests at colleges and universities, here and across the nation, we pray for the protection of free speech, for student and campus safety, for nonviolent action and responses, and for increased understanding and openness to dialogue across division.
- We continue to pray for all who are recovering from recent natural and climate related disasters, especially the tornadoes in the southeastern US. We pray for our rapidly warming planet and for redoubled efforts to reduce fossil fuel emissions.
- We pray for the people of the Democratic Republic of Congo, where ongoing armed conflicts have led to more than 6 million people killed and more than 5 million people displaced from their homes. We pray also for those who have experienced devastating incidents of gender-based violence during the conflicts.
- We pray for all those impacted by the violence of war and political upheaval, throughout the Middle East, in Ukraine, and in Sudan. We pray especially for the people of Haiti, given the heart-wrenching turmoil and gang-related violence leading to the near-collapse of the

government and human services sector.

- We pray for political and climate refugees and migrants who make often life-threatening border crossings over land and open water. We pray for wisdom and justice to prevail as our court system tackles issues of immigration in its rulings.
- We pray for the wellbeing and safety of our trans and gender non-conforming siblings as they face the experience of vitriolic public discourse and of state laws that restrict and criminalize transgender health care, personal expression, and wider LGBTQ+ education.
- We continue to pray for those most affected by changes in reproductive rights: for all those struggling with the moral and political complexities of pregnancy and childbearing, and for patients and healthcare providers who are unable to give and receive care in their own states.
- We pray for the 14 men finding sustenance and protection in our First Church Shelter; and we pray for the guests of the Friday Café, who are finding resources and listening ears.

Prayer for Israel and Palestine

As the war in Gaza and Israel continues, and as the threat of famine in Gaza looms, our hearts cry out in prayer. With the death of 1,400 Israelis and over 35,000 Palestinians so far, we pray for an end to the war and immediate de-escalation of tensions in the region that are threatening a wider and more lasting conflict. We decry the horrifically violent Hamas attacks against Israel on October 7, as well as the disproportionate use of force by the Israeli government and military.

We hold that every person is made in God's image and that every life is precious. We pray for the safe return of all hostages. We pray for redoubled diplomatic efforts to address the already devastating humanitarian crisis in Gaza and the ongoing occupation of Palestinian territories. We continue to pray for a just peace in Palestine and Israel and throughout the region. We also pray for Jews and Muslims, nearby and around the world, who are facing increased threats and acts of anti-Semitic and anti-Muslim discrimination, hatred, and violence.

We continue to pray for ourselves, that we will be courageous, faithful, compassionate, and open to God's love and leading, and to all whom we encounter through these tension-filled times. Across whatever division or disagreement, may our words and deeds seek to honor the humanity and God-given dignity of every human being.

We will review three thefts from African Americans that have been caused by White supremacy in our country: theft of truth, theft of power, and theft of money. We'll look at our participation in these thefts and use the framework of repair as presented by Maimonides, a leading Jewish



philosopher who lived in the 12th century and whose thinking about healing and restoration are still influential today.

Refugee Ministry Update: Meeting a New Need

We are happy to share the great success of the three Welcome Centers we recently hosted for migrant families living in the East Cambridge emergency shelter. Thanks to the wonderful generosity and energy of our volunteers, we provided ESOL to an engaged and motivated group of 67 adults, safe and fun childcare to 26 children, and a delicious hot lunch to all!

The program is now in transition. We are pleased that First Church has built a strong relationship with partners at the state and local level. Because of this, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, along with Immigrant Family Services Institute (IFSI), its contracted case management agency, will be renting space at First Church Monday-Thursday from May 13 to June 20. IFSI will be providing state-mandated case management, ESOL, workforce development, and other services to residents of the East Cambridge Shelter, many of whom we have been working with over the last few Tuesdays.

While we will not be holding our own Welcome Center on Tuesdays for the moment, IFSI still wants our help! They would love volunteers who'd like to work directly with guests on the following: small-group ESOL classes, practicing English, building job skills, preparing resumes, and helping with preschool education.

Volunteers are needed each Monday-Thursday, 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m., May 13 - June 20. To establish partnered relationships with migrants, it is preferred that people commit to the same morning(s) each week as much as possible. If you cannot do that – let us know, we still welcome your help! Contact Martha Cook (marthamuellercook@gmail.com) to learn more and volunteer.

Based in Quito, Ecuador, Mónica travels frequently throughout Latin America and is a fierce advocate for LGBTQI+, indigenous, and women's rights. Advocate for Overdose Prevention Centers in MA!

First Church Shelter Director Jim Stewart and others at First Church continue to support SIFMA Now in advocating for state action to make Overdose Prevention Centers (OPC) available in Massachusetts. Legislation that is awaiting action in both the Massachusetts House of Representatives (H1981) and the Massachusetts Senate (S1242) would help make it possible for communities to host OPCs.



OPCs around the world, most recently New York City, have proven effective in reducing overdose deaths, as well as injection related infections. They

have also been shown to increase participation in treatment and to reduce the amount of injection related detritus (syringes etc) in the neighborhoods that host them. (Read the details here.) Advocates and providers in Cambridge and Worcester are prepared to help stand up and operate OPCs once state legislation is passed.

If you have not already done so, go to: https://malegislature.gov/Search/FindMyLegislator to send an email letting them know it is time to #savelivesnow; encourage them to vote in favor of making Overdose Prevention Centers legal in Massachusetts.

TRANSITION AT FIRST CHURCH

Staffing Update
